The Fingerprints of God Mind: The Sufficient Antecedent

While modern science makes much ado, a pretension of great learning via the ability to rattle off the "facts" of a given piece of the transformation matter, inherent in chemistry and physics, yet no one has paused to address the very nature of reality itself. The reality is modern science that incapable of telling what anything is. While matter and energy can enter into innumerable reactions and counter reactions (and while matter can assume a near infinite number compounds) those altering the mere form of reality: physical change, and those engendering a more profound change in the very nature of matter itself: nuclear chemical and transformations, yet neither matter or energy is capable of autogenesis. All of the innumerable changes in matter and energy, which transpire each second physical in

reality, are spawned by one of three causes: physical, nuclear. chemical or Everything that exists: galaxies, oceans, flowers, fire, love, hate, dreams, floods, etc. has a cause. The cause which brought into existence each effect was the sufficient antecedent of each effect. Every thing—every single thing in the material cosmos, finds its sufficient antecedent in either a physical cause, chemical cause, or a nuclear cause—everything—matter and energy, fields and forces, everything-except the cosmos itself.
